This neighborhood is known as the "Hell of Mexico City" because its an unsafe place, cartel drugs, street children and violence that is lived there

39% of houses have only one bedroom 22.4% of the population survive with less than the minimum wage in Mexico (8 USD)

It is known that 82% of the crimes committed in this neighborhood are robbery, kidnapping and homicide. (Undersecretary of Prevention and Citizen Participation of Segob).





The average schooling is eight years and the school dropout rate is 70%, this means 7 of 10 children will dropout of school before they are 12 years old, and will work on the street, develope addictions, go into drug cartels or gangs. In this place there is also a high consumption and sale of drugs, homicides,, teenage pregnancy, domestic violence, child abuse, lack of job opportunities, illnesses of sexual transmission, lack of life project and purpose, parents with criminal histories.





During the Pandemic, technologic tools were provided to the children of the DUQ Community.


Laptops donations were made, in addition to Provide free internet so the children could connect to their classes

61% of the families in the DUQ Community do not have an Internet connection, mostly due to lack of financial resources and 58% of families do not have a desktop computer, laptop or tablet.




